HISTORY

Some of us heard what a good job they were doing on the West Coast and decided we needed something for this paraculture in the East. We wanted a hospitable setting where we could conduct workshops and seminars, have boutiques, Fashion Shows and Talent Shows and for an opportunity to experience an active social life "en femme".

Provincetown proved to be such a place and in 1975 with a little seed money and large expectations we planned the first Fantasia Fair. Negotiations seemed endless. A few weeks before the Fair was to open, the hotel we planned to stay in declared bankruptcy. However, all the obstacles were surmounted and the Fair began October 15th with 30 participants. The program included a Fashion/Beauty Course, a Fashion Show, numerous mini-boutiques, a Film Festival and the Awards Banquet. It was a huge success.

Since that year there has been a Fantasia Fair every October in Provincetown. This year will be the seventh. Symposiums, Town & Gown Suppers, and Workshops/Seminars have been added - as has the Pool Party. Participants now come from all over the United States, Europe, Canada and Mexico. And each year seems better than last.

Each year a different coordinator and staff works to make the Fair a reality. Among those without whose hands and hearts we would not have had Fantasia Fairs are Betsy Shaw, Paula Neilson, Linda Franklin, Rowena Burke, Nancy Ledins, Denise Reinecke, Diane Berry, Jarah Chandler, Elanda Merz, Winnie Brandt, Rachia Heyelman, Merissa Sherrill Lynn, Ariadne Kane, Delores Carter and Betty Ann Lind, all of whom served on the Steering and Ad Hoc Committees.

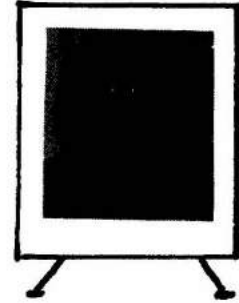
The Winners For 1980

It is awarded to the participant who through her naturalness, comportment and deportment best exemplifies the feminine ideal during Fantasia Fair.



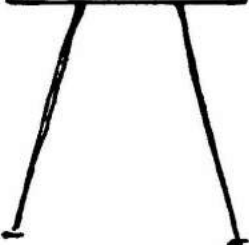
Ms. Most Helpful Jenny

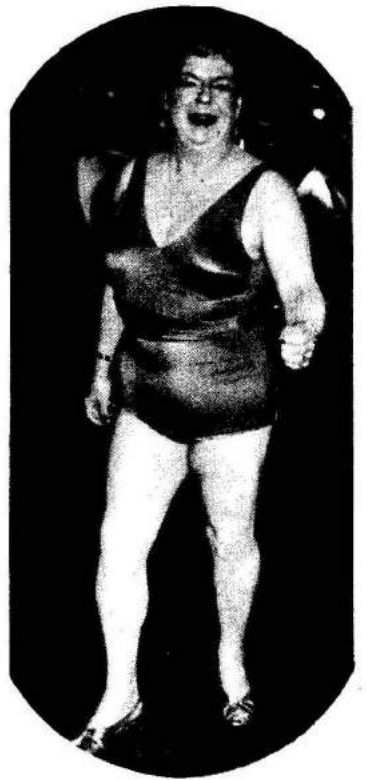

ANDROGYNY WORKSHOPS

ANDROGYNY WORKSHOPS

Androgyny is, in essence, a blending of complimentary masculine/feminine principles to give one a total personality expression.

Offered for the first time at Fantasia Fair, the Androgyny Workshops were divided into two parts. The first was to give participants a rough measure of where they would fit on an Androgyny Scale. To accomplish this we used the Gender Role Inventory System developed by Dr. S. Bem.

The second part of the program involved the use of a guided fantasy in which each participant could discover his anima and/or animus and thus become aware of the extent of their individual androgyny. This phase was accomplished through the expert guidance of Dr. Ed Elkin.

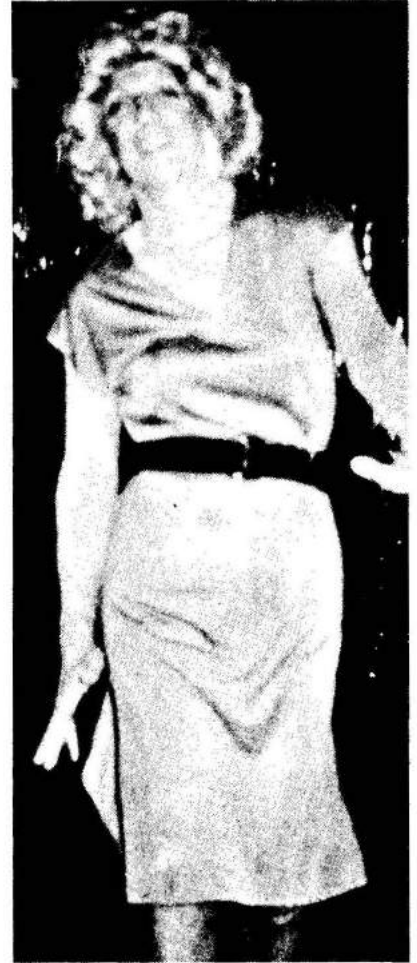


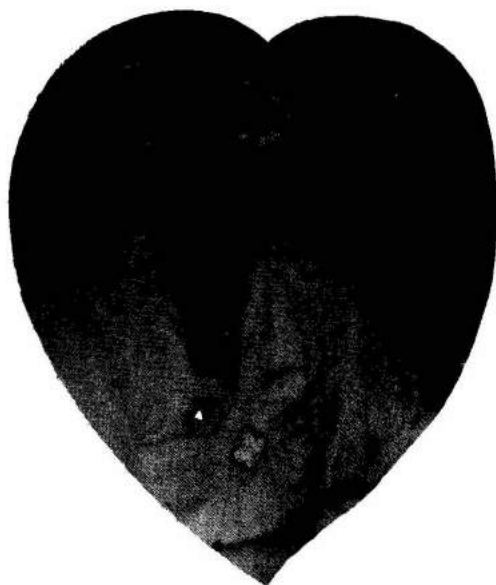

The Medical Aspects Seminar, coordinated by Michelle Williams, featured Dr. David Wesser, noted surgeon, who discussed various medical aspects of interest to this paraculture. A lively question and answer session followed his presentation.

The Sociological Aspects was coordinated by Ariadne Kane and featured discussions related to factors in successful transition to an alternative role. Working with her was Ms. Paula Nielson and Ms. BettyAnn Lind. Several basic role plays were given to illustrate various social situations.

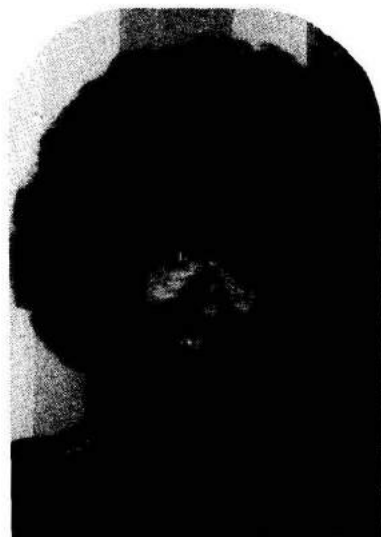

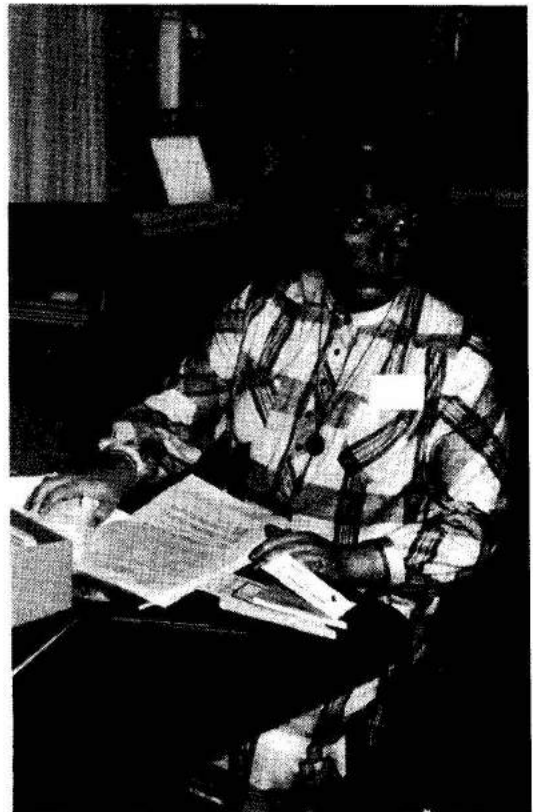

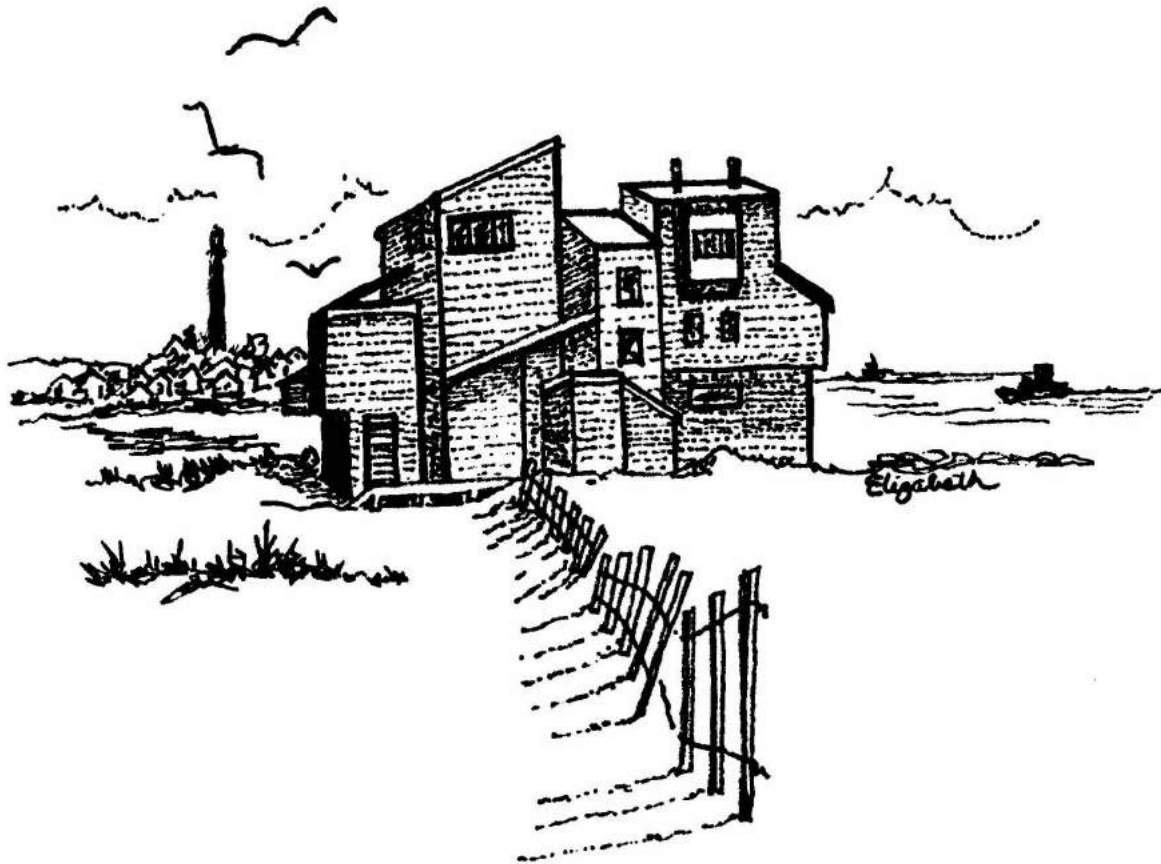


Ariadne Kane
