Fantasia Fair is a week-long transgender event held every October in the resort town of Provincetown, Massachusetts. The Fair attracts people from the entire range of the gender-diverse community: crossdressers, transsexuals, intersex individuals, transmasculine and transfeminine people, anyone who considers themselves gender variant, their significant others, allies, and professionals with an interest in the community.

Started in 1975, Fantasia Fair is the oldest and longest-running gathering of transgender persons for mutual education, support, collaboration, and socializing. Fantasia Fair offers general and specific programs, as well as evening events designed to develop the whole individual.

About Provincetown

You now find yourself in one of the oldest communities in the United States, and for more than 100 years one of America's premier vacation spots. It's well worth spending time to explore both the town, with its fine restaurants, boutiques, and art galleries, and the many majestic natural features of the Upper Cape.

The Pilgrims, fleeing religious persecution in Holland, arrived in the New World in 1620. Before they landed at Plymouth Rock, the Pilgrims stopped here in Provincetown and signed the Mayflower Compact in Provincetown Harbor. In the land that would eventually become Provincetown, they found a wooded area, with large natural dunes along the shore, but water was scarce, so they moved on to the more fertile environs across the bay in Plymouth. Today, their Provincetown landing is commemorated with a small park.

Provincetown became a port of call for seafarers and fishermen during the 1600s, and the carousing, drinking, gambling, and smuggling caused the Capital Puritans to nickname the area Helltown. As more and more settlers arrived, settlements became established along the Cape. Provincetown was itself incorporated as a town in 1727.

Whaling became the principal business of the town, and after New Bedford and Nantucket, Provincetown was one of the great whaling ports of the country: by 1870, it was the wealthiest town in Massachusetts, a fact attested to by the many great late-19th century buildings that dot the landscape. As whaling activity expanded, captains took to replenishing their crews in the Cape Verdes and Azores, bringing to Provincetown Portuguese seamen who, by 1900, would come to dominate the town.

Descendants of Portuguese whalers still abound, operating businesses and fishing boats. Portuguese kale soup (try it!) is a staple in many of the town's restaurants.

Provincetown has a rich and famous history in the arts. Artists began coming to the end of the Cape in the 1870s and they still come today. More than 100 years ago,



Charles Hawthorne opened The Cape Cod School of Arts. Students' easels on the beaches have attracted crowds of onlookers since the opening days of the 20th century. Today, the best viewing of new and classic American art is in the many galleries around town. When you're out shopping or strolling down Commercial Street, take some time to experience the rich art and history in the galleries.

Some of America's premier artists and writers have made their summer homes in Provincetown. Eugene O'Neill wrote many of his early works here; they were performed at a small theater on the wharf. Jackson Pollack, Tennessee Williams, and Jack Kerouac spent summers writing here. Henry David Thoreau and Edna St. Vincent Millay spent time here as well.

Today the city is known primarily as a resort, popular with all sorts of people, but appealing especially to gay men, lesbians, and trans folks. There is much to see and do. From McMillan's Wharf or the deck at Crowne Pointe, you can see across the bay to the mainland and the curve of Cape Cod to the south. Climb the Pilgrim Monument tower and you'll be treated to a stunning view of the entire peninsula! To the north, you'll see the Cape Cod National Seashore, with its magnificent dunes, beaches, and salt forest, just a short drive or bike ride from town. Hiking, biking, bird watching, and ocean swimming (if it's still warm enough!) are all available during Fantasia Fair, with easy access through the National Seashore.

Put on your hiking shoes or rent a bike and follow the trails through the dunes, or take a motorized dunes tour—or perhaps you'd rather go whale watching. There are lots of shops all along Commercial Street and the end-of-season shopping is fantastic. Enjoy the many galleries. Take in a play or enjoy a piano bar. Pamper yourself in one of the many spas.

Whatever you do, enjoy your stay in Provincetown!

Getting Started

If this is your first Fantasia Fair, you may be a bit uncertain about what to do and where to go when you arrive in Provincetown. Fortunately, there is little to be nervous about. Here are some suggestions.



You'll want to plan to arrive at your inn early Sunday afternoon to unload, unpack, and unwind. Sometime between 1:00 and 5:00 pm, make your way to the **Boatslip Resort Hotel**, located at 161 Commercial Street. Here you can check in, pick up your registration packet, get your badge and tickets for the week's activities, and get acquainted with other Fairgoers. If you arrive after 5:00, don't be

too concerned about checking in-you'll have an opportunity to do so on Monday.

Look through your registration packet. It will contain a welcome letter from the organizing committee, the schedule for the week, your 2021 Fantasia Fair charm/pin, and a copy of this *Participant's Guide*, and a swag bag.

You should take a few minutes to review the week's schedule of events. A definitive next day's schedule reflecting any changes will be published daily during the Fair. You can pick up a copy at the Fair Office, and at the lunches. Also familiarize yourself with the *Participant's Guide*, as it contains information about programs, presenters, events, and a second map. We make the guide small enough to fit nicely in a handbag or breast pocket, so you can keep it with you for the entire week.

Fantasia Fair Participant's Guide

If you arrive early enough in the afternoon, you might wish to take a stroll down Commercial Street to do some shopping or grab a quick bite to eat. Don't worry about getting lost—Provincetown isn't very big, and you'll have that map of the town.

After dinner, head back to the Boatslip around 7:30 pm and travel down the stairs to the big room for the Epic Reunion Welcome Reception. Here you'll meet fellow Fairgoers and members of the planning committee. If it's warm enough, feel free to take a stroll around the deck for great views of the ocean.

On Monday morning at 8:30 am, head to the Crown & Anchor, 247 Commercial Street, for our Epic Reunion Kick Off Brunch. Around 10:00, there will be a brief presentation about the week to give you the tools necessary to get the most out of your Fantasia Fair experience. More information on the Kick off Brunch can be found on Page 33 in this guide.

Lunch and Dinner Selections

You will need to select which restaurants you want for lunches and dinner choices for the banquets. Hopefully, you have already made your choices online. If you haven't, you'll need to select which restaurants you want for lunches and dinner. *We ask you to eat at each restaurant at least once over the course of the week*.

Special Needs

For those with special dietary needs, we'll do our best to accommodate you. Please let us know as soon as possible so we can contact the restaurants, or feel free to do it yourself.

Access for the physically disabled can be a problem in Provincetown. Many of the structures were built long ago, and steep stairs, small rooms, and tight spaces are common. If you have trouble getting around, let us know and we'll see what we can do to help.

Arriving Late? Special Assistance?

If you need any special assistance with your check-in or will be arriving after the office is closed for the day, please reach out to the organizing committee at **info@fantasiafair.org** or be sure to stop by the Fair office the next day to check in and get your registration packet.

Inn-Formation

When you arrive in Provincetown, your hosts are the innkeepers and apartment managers where you are staying. Your hosts have come to know us and enjoy us, and each year they look forward to the return of Fantasia Fair. They have always treated us well, and they deserve the same.

In most cases, the innkeepers have invested their life savings in your inn to make it a personal showpiece and competitive in a community where quality is an important criterion. Treat the inn as you would your own home because it is your host's home.

We encourage you to stop by and look at the inns which advertise in this book or are listed on the Recommended Inns page on our website. Some attendees like to stay at a different inn every year, and the innkeepers will be happy to show you around their properties for future reference.

Show Your Appreciation

If you enjoy your stay, make sure to mention that to your innkeepers and their staff. Everyone likes to know they are appreciated.

A great way to show your appreciation is to leave a tip. It's traditional in Provincetown to tip the folks who clean your room. You'll likely find an envelope and your attendant's card. A good rule of thumb for tipping is about \$3 - 5 per day, left upon departure.

Take the time to get to know the staff at your inn. You will quickly find they are great people. They know Provincetown, and they can help make your stay even more enjoyable.

One of the best ways of showing the innkeepers how much you enjoyed your stay is to book there again. For the best selection, book early.

Special Discounts at Inns

Many inns offer a special discount for registered Fairgoers who stay for the full seven days. Be sure to ask about any discounts they may offer. Please note that Fantasia Fair begins on a Sunday, so if you decide to come to town a day or two early, these discounts may not apply and you may be subject to a higher rate for these extra days.

Recommended Inns

Over the years, Fair attendees have tended to prefer certain inns. When an attendee recommends a location to us, we spread the word. We also contact the inn to arrange special rates or packages to encourage more Fair attendees to patronize them.

These recommended inns are listed on our website along with any discounts they offer Fairgoers. Please keep in mind that the rates quoted on the website are for the week of the Fair only, unless otherwise noted.

The fact that an inn is on our website means other Fairgoers have found it fun, pleasant,



clean, and supportive of the trans community. Other inns will also welcome you, and we don't mean to suggest otherwise. If you stay at an inn not listed on our website and you can recommend it, please let us know.

Remember, you register for the Fair directly through us, but must arrange for your own accommodations. Many inns offer a special discount for registered Fairgoers. When contacting the inns, make sure to mention you will be in town for Fantasia Fair and ask what discounts they offer for Fairgoers. The discount should apply to the published seasonal rate for late October. We post information on discounts on our website.

Registration and Checking In

We offer significant discounts for early registration, so most Fantasia Fair attendees register well in advance through the Fair's website. We also offer registration on site. Just make your way to the Fair office at the Boatslip Resort at 161 Commercial Street during posted hours and we'll be happy to sign you up. If you're new to Provincetown, the map near the end of this book will help you find the Boatslip and our other locations.

The Check-In Process

If you registered early, you'll still need to stop by the office to pick up your name badge, meal and event tickets, and other goodies (this book, a map of Provincetown, and a 2021 charm). Look through your packet, and please, make sure your tickets are all in order. You'll leave the office knowing you're good to go for what may well be the most fabulous week of your life.



Sunday check-in begins at 1:00 pm and ends at 5:00 pm. It's a busy time, as most Fairgoers, newly arrived in Provincetown, stash their luggage at their inns and head for the Boatslip. Don't worry about your state of dress at check in, or for that matter, any time during the week. We'll be happy to see you regardless of how you present yourself.

If you miss check-in, don't worry; the office will be open daily Monday through Friday afternoons from 3:00 to 5:00 pm.

Please be sure to check your tickets before you leave the office, since errors can occur.



Your COVID-19 Vaccination card is required!

At the time of the printing of this guide, all attendees are required to show a valid vaccination card at check-in. As an alternative, we will accept a photograph of the card only with a government-issued ID that corresponds with the name on the card. This is the same policy consistent with many of Provincetown's venues and inns.

COVID-19 Precautions

Fantasia Fair 2021 has incorporated all state and local COVID-19 protocols to provide our attendees, presenters, and staff a safe and enjoyable experience. Anyone issued a Fair badge for 2021 is required to provide proof of being fully vaccinated. Mask usage requirements in public spaces is evolving, and the Fair will follow the Town of Provincetown's direction. You should plan on packing an ample supply of masks, you will need them. The Fair office will have hand sanitizer and a limited supply of disposable masks, in case you need one.

To create a seamless experience, the Fair has entered into agreements with our key venue partners to accept the Fair badge as proof of vaccination. This will allow attendees to skip any prescreen lines at shows and events.

To help expedite your check in, please arrive during normal Fair office hours. The Fair office will be open Sunday, October 17th from 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm and every afternoon during Fair week, 3:00 pm to 5:00 pm, Monday through Friday. Please allow adequate time. We appreciate your patience while a Fair leader does the verification and processes your check-in.

For the latest on our COVID-19 response, resources, and mask requirements, please check your Welcome Kit provided at check in.

Video & Photo Policy

Your privacy is your own. No one may take a photo or video of you without your permission. If you feel uncomfortable having your image recorded, please speak up and wear a No Photos button. Please wear your button at all times. These buttons are free and available at the Fair Office. Participants may photograph Fantasia Fair activities for their own purposes, provided the persons being photographed have given their



consent. *Please be especially considerate of partners/spouses, who are easily identifiable.* It is wise and considerate to ask first.

Fantasia Fair reserves the right to prohibit anyone from making recordings at private Fantasia Fair activities. Also, we advise participants that the Fair has no authority to control activity in public areas, such as on the streets of Provincetown or at events open to the public, like the Common Threads Show, Follies, and Keynotes. If you participate in any of these, you should assume your image will be recorded and published. If you are attending one of these events in the audience, be sure to sit away from the stage and please wear your No Photos button if you are camera shy! *If you see a camera pointed at you and you don't like it, say something.*

Media representatives must obtain written permission from the Fair Director to video or take photographs at any function. In addition, media representatives must obtain written releases from any participant photographed or interviewed. This applies to any participant who is acting as an agent or reporter for any media or proprietary publication. The Fair Director must give permission to send photos to publications.

Each year, Fantasia Fair arranges a professional photographer for the week. There is no additional cost to attendees for this service. All photographs will be available via an e-mail link to a secure folder after the conclusion of the Fair. All videos/pictures recorded may be used for publicity purposes, but the Fair will first seek permission from the people in the image. If you submit a video or photograph to us, be sure to provide permissions, or we will not be able to use the images.

Secure Photographs

We are pleased to offer once again, a service for those who have identified themselves by wearing a No Photos button. This option will provide a way for a photo-restricted individual to have a professional photograph taken and delivered to them in a secure manner. It's an option that will be available only at the strict discretion of the photographer and only if a badge with a No Photos button attached is presented. One must make a request directly to the photographer for a secure photograph. Upon acknowledgment, the photographer's storage media will be swapped or a different camera will be used in order to keep the images separate from the non-secure pool. Prior to any photos being taken, a picture will be taken of the name badge with the No Photos button attached.

Upon the conclusion of the Fair, the photos will be e-mailed directly to the address on file. We will not archive or store any copies.

Comportment

We have no hard and fast rules about behavior or dress code. Please be aware that the Fair takes place in the public streets of a town and there is zero tolerance for nudity.

If anyone gets out of line, they'll know it, we'll know it, and the other attendees will know it. If someone is offending or bothering you or is behaving inappropriately, talk to anyone on the Fair organizing committee and they will address the situation.

Recognition of Our Differences

Fantasia Fair is a place to celebrate the diversity within our community. Please recognize each of us is on our own journey and may live a life different from yours. Not everyone wants to be a woman or a man in the same way, and some of us don't want to be either. We may identify as crossdressers or as transsexuals or as non-binary individuals, or we may choose not to accept any particular label. We may live our lives with a singular gender expression or with different expressions for different audiences, and we may be at Fantasia Fair to try out a new expression. *Please be respectful of people's choices of names and pronouns*, which will usually be on their name badges. When in doubt, just ask!

Please also be mindful that many of us have struggled with the world forcing its own definition of who we are. Coming to Fantasia Fair might require every ounce of confidence one has, so please be wary of making unflattering or lighthearted comments.

Fantasia Fair strives to welcome people of all gender identities and all sexual orientations. Please recognize that not everyone is out and not everyone wants to go full time. Some of us have a very real need for privacy and guard it zealously. *Please respect the privacy of others, especially that of first-timers and the SOs. If you are curious about a person's identity or appearance or sexuality, ASK FIRST if it's okay to ask them questions. If they say no or appear uncomfortable, don't go further.*



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Tickets

Your name badge will get you into workshops and some events, but the tickets you were given at check-in are required for meals, banquets, and major events like the Epic Reunion Bingo Festival, Common Threads show, and the Follies talent show.

Be sure to keep your tickets safe, and be sure to bring them with you to events. Many Fairgoers keep their tickets in the plastic lanyards that hold their name badge. Some Fairgoers, not wanting to risk losing their tickets, put the day's tickets in the holder every morning.

You'll be asked for your ticket at meals and ticketed events. Be sure to produce the right ticket! Tickets are plainly labeled and color-coded by event to help you keep track of them. PLEASE REMEMBER TO WEAR YOUR BADGE AT ALL TIMES!

We don't require much of you at Fantasia Fair, but we've learned that to keep our costs down, we must be strict about tickets. Tickets are required for all meals and special events.

Please understand—planning an event with so many moving parts is tricky. We have meals at several different establishments and use as many as four restaurants on any given day. We negotiate meal prices and numbers with multiple restaurants long before the Fair starts and must give their managers a headcount several days in advance so they can order and receive the food our Fairgoers will be eating. We must meet minimum seating requirements for each restaurateur or we pay full price for uneaten meals. Without policies for tickets, things can easily spiral out of control—and have in the past. Therefore, we ask for your cooperation with the following policies.

• You must produce your ticket. If you don't have a ticket, you will be required to either go get it or pay the cost of the event listed below. Don't fret, though. At any time, you can take your ticket and the receipt for your payment to the office for an immediate

 Lunch tickets are specific to individual restaurants. You must produce a ticket for that restaurant on that day, or you will be required to pay for your meal. The Farewell Breakfast \$15 coupon is valid only on Sunday 10/24, 7:30 am - 11:00 am. Farewell Breakfast coupons are non-transferable, only one coupon per person, and no cashback.

refund. This is the case for all lunches, banquets, and evening meals, and ticketed events.

- You can exchange lunch tickets beforehand. You might decide you would like to go to a different restaurant, or perhaps your friends will be at one restaurant and you are scheduled at another. In either case, just go to the office the day prior with your ticket. If space is available, we'll be happy to trade lunch tickets with you.
- **Buying additional tickets this year will be limited.** No tickets can be sold to the Epic Reunion Bingo Festival. Tickets to the Common Threads Fashion Show, Open Mic Night, and Follies are available at the door.
- Tickets to the Saturday banquet are not available to non-Fairgoers. We have a very small number of tickets; these go first to current Fairgoers and second to those who are Fair alumni. These tickets are sold at the sole discretion of the Fair Director, to whom all requests should be directed no later than Thursday afternoon.
- Please turn in your unused tickets. If you will be skipping a meal or an event—if you don't feel well, or if you have other plans, or if you are called back home early, please stop by the office and turn in your tickets. Otherwise, the Fair will pay for your uneaten meal. Untouched plates of course drive up our cost and ultimately the price of registration, so please turn in the tickets you won't be using.
- You may not give your meals tickets to another person. This applies to lunches, banquets, receptions, and the Epic Reunion Bingo Festival. Your name is preprinted on your tickets and all tickets are non-transferrable.
- Ticket pricing for 2021: Lunches/brunch \$27, Epic Reunion Banquet/Dance \$75, Common Threads Show \$10, Open Mic Night \$5, Follies \$20, Awards Banquet \$100.

We're sorry to inconvenience you, but the above policies are necessary in order to control our costs while balancing the capacity of our venues. Your cooperation helps us reduce expenses by minimizing the number of empty plates we pay for and ultimately lowers registration costs. Thank you so much for helping us.

Be a part of the audience, or better yet perform together. Saturday night, the banquet celebrates all of us. At all these events, you're among friends.

When you come to Fantasia Fair, you eat well. Of course, holding the event in Provincetown means you'll have access to the many top-notch restaurants that help make Cape Cod a favorite tourism destination.

In addition to the food provided at the Epic Reunion Welcome Reception, the Epic Reunion Banquet & Dance Party, and the Gala Awards Banquet, your registration includes either a lunch or a brunch every day. We make arrangements with several highly-regarded establishments so you can choose where you want to eat each day.

When you register, you select the restaurants at which you wish to have lunches and your meal choice for the Gala Awards Banquet; you pick up your meal tickets when you check in at the registration desk.

We can't stress this enough: Each participant needs to bring the proper tickets to each event and to each lunch. After-Hours at Tin Pan Alley


Tin Pan Alley is the Fair's official after-hours space for Fair attendees to socialize, share some yummy snacks and laughs!



247 COMMERCIAL STREET, PROVINCETOWN



In 1836, Timothy P. Johnson built the Central House. Offering all the delights of a saloon including lively entertainment, and set on Provincetown's main thoroughfare while extending to the beach, the property has a solid history of genial hospitality and remarkable entertainment.

In 1868, Allen Reed purchased the establishment from Johnson's heirs, added rooms for lodging and a billiard hall, making it Provincetown's largest hotel. He passed the building on to his son, James A. Reed who ran the Town's Custom Office here. While always known more as an entertainment complex than as a hotel, the rooms welcomed victims of U-boat attacks off Cape Cod shores just prior to our entering World War IJ, and others for more than 150 years.

As various times called the New Central House, Ocean House, and Sea Horse Inn, offering beach cabanas, smoking rooms, bowling and a ladies' reading room. Stan Sorrentino reopened this impressive Greek revival as the Crown & Anchor Motor Inn in 1962. Like many Bostonians who enjoyed getaways to Provincetown, James "Whitey" Bulger was a regular visitor. The Whaler's Wharf fire of 1998 caused more than

55 million in damages and burned 17 businesses along the harbor including destroying much of 247 Commercial Street which was rebuilt with respect for its architectural history in 1999.

Rick Murray and Bill Dougal have owned the Crown, which now includes the Crown Cabaret, Paramount Nightclub, Crown & Anchor Restaurant, Poolside Bar, Wave Video Bar, and Vault Leather Bar, since 2001. The long list of celebrity entertainers who have appeared here includes Bobby Short, Nina Simone, Eartha Kitt, Sally Field, Billy Porter, Bernadette Peters, Alan Cumming, and Lily Tomlin.

Today's Crown is also noted for its generous and continual support of many community organizations including the Provincetown Harbor Swim for Life and Paddler Flotilla, Helping Our Women (HOW), Outer Cape Health Services, and the AIDS Support Group of Cape Cod.




Epic Reunion Comic Bingo Festival

Besides being a fun evening, the Follies is also a charitable fundraising event. Tips given to the performers are donated to charity. In past years, Fan Fair has contributed to the town's library, the Provincetown Police Department, an AIDS support group, a local hospice facility, soup kitchen, the Provincetown LGBT Welcome Center. the UU church, and senior services group. One year we purchased a life-saving





defibrillator for the Fire Department. Since the Follies

began, the show has helped us raise more than \$55,000 for deserving organizations that serve the people of Provincetown and Cape Cod. This year with many charities needing our support we will be making donations to several local charitable organizations that need the help!



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Transgender Pioneer Award

Since 2002, the Transgender Pioneer Award has honored trans leaders once a year at Fantasia Fair. It is a lifetime achievement award to those who have sacrificed their careers, their families, and their fortunes to change the world so trans people could begin to come together in safety and comfort. Without them, we would not be here; we would be at home, hiding in our closets. We meet to honor their work and thank them for all they have done for us and to give them back a little in return for their decades of work on our behalf.

The award is presented by the board of directors of International Transgender Education Organization. For 2021, the Reverend Moonhawk River Stone is our nominee.

We will meet at the historic Crown & Anchor, Cabaret Room, 247 Commercial Street on Saturday, October 23rd at 1:30pm for the annual award presentation plus a keynote address via teleconference.



The Reverend Moonhawk River Stone is a psychotherapist, consultant, educator, and author in private practice in the Albany, NY area.

Rev. Stone is a Licensed Mental Health Counselor in the state of New York, an Interfaith Minister, and a monk initiated in the Sacred Order of Sanyassi

For more than 35 years, Rev. Stone has specialized in his clinical practice in working with the LGBT community—especially with transgender people of all ages and their families. Rev. Stone's additional specializations include trauma survivors (child and adult), autism, ADHD, and dissociative disorders.

Rev. Stone was board chair of the International Foundation for Gender Education, Co-Chair of the New York Association for Gender Rights Advocacy, and board member for Empire State Agenda as their first transgender member. He served many years on the National LGBTQ Task Force, where he did significant work in the early days of intersectionality, particularly around ableism and racism. He was a pioneer in gender transition in the workplace, and the model he developed has been in wide use for more than two decades.

His is a leading voice for the removal of the diagnosis Gender Dysphoria from the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of the American Psychiatric Association.

Rev. Stone is this year's recipient of the Transgender Pioneer Award.

The Brenda Viola Most Helpful Award

Presented by Sibil Greiner

This award is given to the person who gives most unstintingly of their time and energy in service to Fantasia Fair and its attendees. The award is named for longtime Fair attendee and volunteer Brenda Viola. Brenda served on the planning committee and did the daily Fair newsletters for many years. Brenda was always willing to chip in and do her share and more, always with a smile on her face. The awardee is chosen by the Fantasia Fair Planning Committee.

The Alison Laing Congeniality Award

Presented by Kristi Chiasson

The Alison Laing Congeniality Award is chosen by secret ballot from all participants attending the Fair. The award goes to the participant who was the most open, outgoing, easy to talk with, and friendly, and who gave a sparkle to the group. This award is named after Alison Laing, who with her wife Dottie played a huge role in Fantasia Fair during the 1980s and 1990s. Both are beloved by the Fair. They were both outgoing and friendly, but Alison went out of her way to make people feel comfortable with themselves, here at the Fair and elsewhere. She received the Congeniality Award in 1986 and the Fantasia Fair Award in 1992. She was, among other things, an author, a founder of the nonprofit Renaissance Education Association, and past Executive Director of the International Foundation for Gender Education. Many of Alison's photographs can be found at the Digital Transgender Archive. Their publication there caused a minor sensation when they first appeared.



FEATURE STORY: Rupert Raj



Canadian transman Rupert Raj has a long and storied history as an activist and therapist. He was born in 1952 in Ottawa to an East Indian mother and a Polish father. His parents were killed in an automobile accident in 1968. Rupert was just 16 years old.

By age 19, Rupert was seeing psychiatrist Charles Ihlenfeld in Dr. Harry Benjamin's office for hormones. In 1975 after graduating from Carleton University with a B.A. in psychology, he relocated to Vancouver, British Columbia and straightaway launched an

unsuccessful petition that demanded Ontario cover gender reassignment surgery under

its provincial health insurance plan.

In 1979, Rupert founded The Foundation for the Advancement of Canadian Transsexuals. He edited the organization's *Gender Review: A FACTual Journal*, until 1982. In the same year, he resigned from his



leadership and editing positions at FACT and launched the Metamorphosis Medical Research Foundation, which existed to develop and sell a penile prosthesis as an alternative to phalloplasty. He served as an information broker between the medical establishment and transmen and their families. He was an influence on other transmen, including Lou Sullivan, founder of San Francisco's FTM group.

In 1988, Rupert launched yet another organization, Gender Worker (later, Gender Consultants), which published the *Gender NetWorker* newsletter, which aimed to assist helping professionals who worked with transgender people. He took a decade-long hiatus from his gender work during the 1990s and returned in 1999 to start the Trans-Men/FTM Peer-Support Group in Ontario.

In 2001, Rupert earned a Master of Arts degree in Counseling Psychology. His thesis advanced a positive transgender therapeutic model that helped make the pathologybased medical model obsolete. He became a Canadian Certified Counselor in 2015. He resides in Toronto, where he works as a psychotherapist, gender specialist, and professional trainer. He conducts training workshops across Canada.

Rupert's memoir *Dancing the Dialectic* is now in its second edition. He has produced a book of trans-related poetry, several book chapters, and four journal articles.

Monday

Hormone Therapy – The Knowns and Unknowns in an Aging Society. *Michael S. Irwig, MD*

Michael S. Irwig, MD, F.A.C.E., is a board-certified endocrinologist at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center in Boston where he serves as Director of Transgender Medicine. He is an Associate Professor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School.

Dr. Irwig is a general endocrinologist with a particular interest and expertise in transgender care and androgens. His research has focused on transgender health, men with persistent sexual and non-sexual side effects of finasteride (Propecia) and men with borderline testosterone levels. He has over 40 peer-reviewed publications and his research findings have been featured in many national and international mainstream publications and broadcast outlets.

Tuesday

Substance Abuse in the Transgender Community: The problem and its treatments *Carrie Chandler, MD*

Dr. Carrie Chandler serves as medical director of a midwestern, community-based, addiction agency covering six counties. Providing both behavioral health and medical services, the agency is also an Opioid Treatment Program and offers buprenorphine (e.g. Suboxone[®]), methadone and naltrexone (Vivitrol[®]) medications to appropriate clients in conjunction with counseling. Dr. Chandler has been approved as a certified addiction specialist by the American Academy of Health Care Providers in the Addictive Disorders.

Wednesday Good Girls Don't ... But She Did Anyway Carole MacKenzie, LCSW, AASECT

Carole MacKenzie, LCSW, grew up when good girls didn't do anything they weren't supposed to do. "Little girls are made of sugar and spice and everything nice." So, WTF is wrong with that? Almost everything. Carole will tell us how and why she got from Pasadena 82 years ago to P'town and Fanfair today.

Thursday Same Storm, Different Boats Carolyn Wolf-Gould, MD

"The pandemic changed all of our lives in profound ways. Some lost loved ones or suffered from illness themselves. Some worked extra hard and some lost their jobs. Some stepped up and out while others stepped back and in — all as part of the call to care for those in need. And now the Delta Variant of the COVID virus is creating new challenges, just when we thought it might be safe to move on. While buffeted by the same storm, we sail in dramatically different seas with unique ships. Although our experiences differed, most of us experienced isolation from our families and communities in ways that changed our relationships to one another, our work, and to our pre-pandemic lives. We will take this hour to reflect on our experiences, share our stories, bear witness to our varied experiences, and rekindle connections within our beloved community."

Demystifying Gender Affirmation Surgery – An Operative Tour John Whitehead, DO

Dr. John L. Whitehead is a multi-board-certified general surgeon and specialist in gender reassignment surgery. After completing medical school at Chicago College of Osteopathic Medicine, Dr. Whitehead completed a five-year general surgery residency at the same institution. He trained as a trauma surgeon at Cook County Hospital.

After a brief history of gender-affirming surgery, Dr. Whitehead will talk about the current surgical market trends in the US. He will then give you an operative tour of the most common transmasculine and transfeminine surgical procedures (graphic material will be presented).

Saturday Transgender Pioneer Award Presentation Reverend Moonhawk River Stone

Moonhawk River Stone is a psychotherapist, consultant, educator, and author in private practice in the Albany, NY area. He is an out, open, and proud transsexual man. Reverend Stone is a Licensed Mental Health Counselor in the state of New York, an Interfaith Minister, and a Hindi Sanyasi Monk.

For more than 30 years, Reverend Stone has specialized in his clinical practice in working with the LGBT community (especially with transgender people of all ages and their families), with survivors of childhood trauma, and with people with dissociative disorders. He has served many roles as an activist and educator and continues to work diligently for transgender civil rights.

Workshop:

Fantasia Fair Participant's Guide

It Ain't Me, Babe–But maybe It Is (Cis partners only) Carole MacKenzie, LCSW

This workshop will focus on the journey of the non-transgender member of the relationship. It will shift the conversation to their needs and challenges. **Focus Questions:**

What does being the partner of a transgender person mean about you? How has it changed you? What have you learned? What are the losses and what are the gains? How does this fact fit into the larger frame of your individual life story? How do you feel as a cis partner in cis and trans spaces? How do you see the future?

Workshop:

Journaling as Imaginative and Healing Exercise Ivy Monroe

Journaling provides a fabulous medium for recording one's life and feelings, but it holds so much more potential for creatively examining one's life, desires, and experiences through writing. This workshop will focus on using journaling as a generative tool to explore one's life through imagining alternate pasts, futures, and presents and how writing through those can open opportunities for greater selfunderstanding and clarity.

Workshop:

Learning to Define and to Communicate Your Needs, and to Negotiate with Your Partner Fairly. (Couples in Attendance Only)

Maureen Osborne, PhD, and Carole MacKenzie, LCSW

Whatever the state or stage of your relationship, there are special challenges in a cis/trans relationship, among them a loss of trust, a need for re-definition of self, potential disruptions in family ties, and a crisis of intimacy. Such challenges require self-examination, fearless and mutually respectful dialogue, and negotiation. We will look at some principles and strategies that should ease the way.

Focus questions:

How do you handle conflict in your relationship? Does one person give in more often? Do you speak your mind or are you easily silenced? How do you ask for what you need? Do you know what you need? When your feelings change, can you slow things down or ask for more without risking hurt or alienation? Is one partner better with words than the other? Do you feel that one person has more power, and if so, why? What agreements have you made that feel as if they've been violated? Are there mitigating factors? Is intentionality important? Can you discern and communicate what you need from your partner in order to feel safe again in your relationship? Is there any part of your reaction to perceived trust violations that has its roots in your own family and relationship history? Is there anything that you do that makes it less likely for your partner to treat you in a trustworthy way?

Workshop: Lost in the Pink Fog Liz Winter

You finally made it to Provincetown, and Fantasia Fair was the most fabulous experience of your life. You're pumped up, full of new self-confidence, and unable to think about anything but expressing yourself in your preferred gender role. Back at home, the world seems drab and you chafe at having to hide part of yourself from your family, friends, and co-workers. You want to burst forth, heedless of consequences, and proclaim yourself to the world, and you think you just might. Congratulations. You're in the Pink Fog. The Pink Fog (Blue Fog for FTMs, and we suppose Lavender Fog for nonbinary folks) is the state of euphoria we experience when we take our gender expression to a new level. It's a dangerous time to make decisions, and yet a time when we most want to. Come talk about the Pink Fog with your peers and get suggestions on how to find your way out of it. *Highly recommended for first timers.*

Lunch

Five lunches and a brunch are included with your full-week registration. These meals are in various restaurants, all within easy walking distance from the center of town. When you check in at the office to get your registration packet, you'll receive a sheet of tickets for the restaurants you pre-selected at registration. Workshop:

Meet Your Fellow Couples: Telling (or Updating) Our Unique Love Stories (Couples in Attendance Only)

Maureen Osborne, PhD, and Carole MacKenzie, LCSW

In this workshop for couples only, we will give ourselves the time and space to meet fellow travelers and tell our stories in a safe and supportive environment. Intended for first-timers as well as couples who have been coming to FanFair for years. **Focus Questions:**

How long have you been together? How did you meet? When and how did you hear about your partner's transgender nature? How are you both handling that now? Do you have children? If so, tell us about them. Who among your family and friends know about the transgender part of your relationship? How has that been? What is the best thing about your relationship? The most difficult?

Workshop: My Gender-Affirming Surgery Temperance Faye DuWitt

In April 2021, Temperance underwent gender-affirming surgery (Bottom Surgery.) As someone who has completed the research into the surgery, made the relevant inquiries, and has made the conscious decision to undergo it, she is fully aware of the intense anxiety which can accompany contemplating this life-changing event. The purpose of this presentation is for her to communicate her personal experiences of before, during, and after her surgery. By attending this presentation, shared from a completely personal and subjective view, hopefully, you may get a clearer understanding of the experience.

Night Out on the Town!

Part of what makes Fantasia Fair special is it takes place in Provincetown. Few places are as accepting and affirming as our host city, and here you will be safe, respected, and honored, whatever your gender presentation. Fairgoers are encouraged to explore the restaurants, bars, and dance clubs of Provincetown. As you plan your dinner reservations for your nights out at the Fair, please try to support our advertisers, who have supported the Fair in this *Participant's Guide* and on our website. When making your choices, please be sure to tell the wait staff and manager you saw their ad in the Fantasia Fair guide. There are a variety of fine restaurants to choose from in all cuisines and price ranges, all within walking distance or, for those wearing sky-high stilettos, a short cab ride from the center of town.

Workshop: (Couples in Attendance only-split sessions) Not What I Bargained For - Reimagining Emotional and Physical Intimacy. Maureen Osborne, PhD. (Cis partner in attendance only in this session) Carole MacKenzie, LCSW (Trans partner in attendance only in this session)

A loss of intimacy is the most often reported casualty of a relationship in which one partner comes out as trans. We will explore the many reasons for this and will dig into practical strategies for reclaiming emotional closeness and sexual expression against the daunting headwinds of trust damage and perceived changes in sexual orientation.

Focus Questions:

What changes in sexual and/or emotional intimacy have you experienced in relation to one partner coming out as trans? How have they affected you individually and as a couple? What do you need in order to rework the underpinnings of intimacy in your relationship? What about you and/or your partner gets in the way? What are you willing to try to change these patterns? Can you have satisfactory emotional intimacy even if sexual intimacy is not part of your relationship?

Office Hours and Check In

Information Session:

Ongoing Research Project on the Histories of Transvestite Organizations and Publications *Ivy Monroe*

This session will provide information on a research project currently being conducted that examines the histories of organizations and publications by and for people who identified as transvestites or crossdressers. This includes, but is by no means limited to, organizations such as Fantasia Fair, the Foundation for Personal Expression (FPE), Empathy Club, or the International Foundation for Gender Education (IFGE) and publications including *Transvestia, New Trenns Magazine, Transvestite World Directory, Chrysalis Quarterly,* or *Salmacis.* Focused on the period between 1960 and 1986, this work is hoping to better understand the multitude of identities and experiences which have existed and continue to exist under an umbrella of trans identity.

This session and research is being conducted by Ivy Monroe, a trans-femme (she/her) Masters student and scholar interested in the histories of trans identities, experiences, and organizations. Ivy is currently seeking people who would be interested in being interviewed about their experiences. All interviews will be entirely confidential. People of all gender identities and experiences are welcome and one need not have pursued any form of social, medical or legal transition or be publicly out to participate. This information session will provide a brief overview of Ivy's work, how you can get involved, and will be followed by open Q&A.

Workshop:

Oral Interviews with Virginia Prince and Ariadne Kane, Activists Extraordinaire *Dallas Denny*

Over the course of the week of Fantasia Fair 1995 I spent many hours with the late Virginia Prince, recording her story and viewpoints. More than 20 years later I did the same in Albany, NY with Fantasia Fair founder and Director Ariadne Kane. Learn about these two historic personages, their accomplishments, their courage, their strengths, and their flaws, and listen to passages told in their own voices: How Fantasia Fair almost didn't happen (Ari) and teenage crossdressing adventures (Virginia).

Workshop:

Policing in Provincetown and Beyond *Officer Jennifer Nolette*

This workshop will provide a history of policing in Provincetown in regards to the LGBT community. This workshop will describe how we, as the Provincetown Police Department, strive to make sure the trans community feels protected and safe while in our town. We will discuss the anatomy of a hate crime, including the dynamics of hate incidents and bias indicators. Even if an incident does not rise to the level of a hate crime, we will explain why it is important for people to report the incident to the police. Additionally, we will discuss how to be a good witness and what to expect after you report an incident to the police.

Workshop: Positively Trans Jenna and Erin Daily

Whether you believe you can do some or you believe you cannot either way you are right -Henry Ford

What are your short-term intentions? What is standing in the way of your intentions? What is holding you back? We will show you some tools to help you along the way. Your thoughts have more of an effect than you think. Our intentions with this workshop are to help you change your thinking so nothing stands in your way. This workshop will be an open forum to discuss and share tools to aid you during your transition, having a great week at Fantasia Fair, or even changing lifelong limiting beliefs that may stand in the way of living authentically.

Workshop:

Some Issues When Writing About Transgender History: A Lively Discussion Carolyn Wolf-Gould, MD

In December, the four of us will be turning in the manuscript we have been working on for three years. Our publisher is SUNY Press, and the title of our book will be *From Margins to Mainstream: A History of Transgender Medicine in the United States*. Our topic isn't the book itself (although we will be happy to answer any questions). Instead, we'll be talking about issues we raised among ourselves in its preparation, including: what terms should we use to describe gender-variant historical personages who lived in a time before there were names for who they were? How do we honor them when we aren't sure how they might identify if they were alive today? What pronouns should we use for those who gave no indication which they might prefer? We know which pronouns to use to describe those who transitioned, but what pronouns should we use when writing about their early lives? Come prepared for a lively discussion.

Workshop:

Stand By Me: Being Trans in a Committed Relationship with a Cisgender Partner (All trans people in a relationship are invited)

Maureen Osborne, PhD.

This workshop will focus on the trans member of a relationship and the challenges they have faced in trying to balance their needs for gender expression/transition with the needs of their cisgender partner to catch up with the new context this presents for them. **Focus Questions:**

How did you come out to your spouse as trans? Was it a long-anticipated relational ripple or an unexpected tsunami? If you are still together, how are you dealing with the day-to-day dilemmas of balancing your needs against your partner's? How do you manage the problem of your changing needs, i.e., the moving target issue? If your relationship did not survive, what were the reasons, as you see them? How does this reality fit into the larger frame of your individual life history? How do you see the future?

Workshop: The Reunion: Reading of the Play Dallas Denny

As society continues to rapidly shift its understandings of gender and transness, the experiences of gender-diverse people can vary widely from one generation to the next. This workshop will be hosted by Ivy Monroe, a trans-femme (she/her) scholar and artist based out of the University of Kentucky whose work focuses on the histories of geographies of trans identities and experiences

Workshop:

Virtual Makeover: Why FaceApp is a Game-Changer, and How it Has Affected Me Dallas Denny

COME PREPARED TO MAKE YOURSELF OVER! FaceApp is a photo and video editing application for iOS and Android. It uses neural networks to allow users to change their faces in a number of realistic ways. In early July, I idly downloaded it because I was curious. I wasn't prepared for the impact it would have on me. I'll talk about the application while projecting actual and enhanced images of my own face, and invite those in attendance to download the program and alter their own appearances. As you might imagine, such a virtual paintbrush is a ready-made fantasy playground for transgender people—but for me it was personal and realistic. I was able to make simple yet dramatic changes in makeup and hairstyle and color that left my facial features absolutely the same, but allowed me to see how I might have looked had I been interested in being glamorous in my earlier years and paid more attention to my makeup and hair. I will discuss the insights this triggered about my psyche and how it led to recent decisions to alter my body.

Volunteer Planning Sibil Greiner

If you want to get the most out of your Fantasia Fair experience, then get involved! Find out about opportunities to volunteer throughout the week in this brief get-together.

Walking Tour (Tour time will be about 1.75 hours) Carrie Lopes

Experience the sites of Provincetown in this fun and informative tour that focuses on the history and architecture of this seaside community. Your guide, Carrie is retired from the Provincetown Police Department, where she was responsible for touring the new recruits around town as part of their orientation. Today you will be the new recruits as Carrie leads you through the fabulous streets and quaint hidden ways to discover stories about the town. Please wear your comfortable walking shoes!



Workshop: What Causes Being Transgender? Dana J. Bevan, PhD.

This workshop will describe the four factors of transgender causation that are supported by scientific evidence and the implications of these factors for cultural issues. Definitions for sex and gender used in the presentation will be provided as well as current estimates of population frequencies of being transgender. Genetics, epigenetics, Western culture and early learning appear to be currently involved. Our understanding of how gender behavior occurs is a cascade of factors which are mixtures of biology and human culture/learning, rather than strict nature vs. nurture. Scientific knowledge helps address such issues as: the efficacy of gender change efforts (reparative therapy), affirmative treatment, and whether sex can really be changed. The workshop will also list factors that have been suggested in the past but are not supported or refuted by current evidence. These include: prenatal hormones, DES, rapid-onset gender dysphoria, and childhood trauma.

Workshop:

Wrap-up and Question Box session (Couples in Attendance Only) Maureen Osborne, PhD and Carole MacKenzie, LCSW

The first half of this final session, Carole and Maureen will address anonymous questions put into the "question box" available during each group session. There are no dumb questions! Then, each couple will have an opportunity to share what they have learned in the week and to commit to one thing they want to do differently going forward, based on what they've learned.

FEATURE STORY: Steve Dain



Steve Dain, MA, DC, ND (1939-2007) was the first famous transsexual man in the United States. Steve had been a girls' physical education teacher from 1966 to 1976 at Emery High School in Emeryville, CA, just across the Bay from San Francisco, and had been selected as California's Teacher of the Year, but over the summer of 1976, Steve transitioned from female to male. When classes resumed that fall, he was promptly fired. To justify his firing, he was charged with "immoral conduct" for taking sick leave to have his surgery, which the school administrators refused to accept as treating a legitimate medical condition; therefore,

since he took sick leave without actually being sick, he had lied; hence, he was deemed morally unfit to teach minors.

Steve's legal battle to retain the profession he loved catapulted him to national notoriety. His story made all the major newspapers, TV News, and most of the nation's talk shows of the day. Steve was handsome, articulate, and poised. He was not ashamed of his transition. He believed education



about transsexualism was necessary to shift public opinion and end discrimination against gay, lesbian, bisexual, and trans people. However, his star was eclipsed by the announcement of Renée Richards' transition in the *New York Times* in 1997, which wiped Steve from that paper's front page. He persisted in his legal battle and was ultimately awarded \$19,000.00 in damages. The school district was ordered to restore his teaching credential, but the administration dragged their feet and would not produce paperwork declaring his record cleared, so he was never rehired. He tried working in building construction and tile-setting. Ultimately, he returned to school to become a chiropractor, opening a practice in Union City, CA. He appeared in the well-known 1984 documentary film, "What Sex am I," directed by Lee Grant. He also taught human physiology at Life Chiropractic College West, and human sexuality at Ohlone Community College in Fremont. Steve inspired and mentored many trans people, including Lou Sullivan, and later, myself. He died of complications of breast cancer in 2007 at the age of 68.



In 2021, the City of Emeryville named a portion of the street adjacent to the remodeled gymnasium at Emery High School as Steve Dain Drive and issued a formal apology for the wrong that was done to him. To my knowledge, this is the first instance of any public property being named in honor of a trans man.

He served many years on the National LGBTQ Task Force, where he did significant work in the early days of intersectionality, particularly around ableism and racism. He was a pioneer in gender transition in the workplace, and the model he developed has been in wide use for more than two decades. He served on the board of FTMI International from 1997-1999.

Rev. Stone was co-founder, in 1988, of the Fulton-Montgomery AIDS Task Force, and served as board co-chair. He has presented hundreds of workshops and talks and done training at dozens of professional and community conferences, and his writing has been widely published. He has served as a consultant for universities and IBM and other multinational corporations. He continues to work diligently for transgender civil rights. His is a leading voice for the removal of the diagnosis Gender Dysphoria from the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of the American Psychiatric Association. Rev. Stone is this year's recipient of the Transgender Pioneer Award.

Prior to founding Quiet Wealth, Lindsey spent over a decade in Silicon Valley finance. She served as director of operations for Sapphire Ventures, and she was previously a technology investment banker at Credit Suisse in San Francisco.



Lindsey is currently a board member of FreeState Justice, the leading LGBTQ legal advocacy group in Maryland.

Lindsey earned a B.A. in economics and psychology from Williams College and an M.B.A. from Harvard Business School, where she focused her studies on finance and entrepreneurial management.

She is a licensed Investment Adviser Representative and a licensed insurance adviser in the State of Maryland, and she holds the Certified Exit Planning Advisor designation.

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FEATURE STORY: Louise Lawrence (1912-1976)



Louise Lawrence was an early advocate for gender-nonconforming people. She was the first person Virginia Prince contacted, and it was Louise's list of 100 or so crossdressers that Virginia used when she started her magazine *Transvestia*. Louise was one of Harry Benjamin's first ten trans patients and remained in close contact with him, and she collaborated with sexologist Alfred Kinsey and referred interviewees to

him. According to Dana Bevan (who is presenting here at Fantasia Fair this year), both Tri-Ess and the World Professional Association for Transgender Health (formerly the Harry Benjamin International Gender Dysphoria Association) were launched at Louise's kitchen table in San Francisco. Dana writes, "Louise seemed to know everyone in the U.S. and the world who were concerned with transgender advocacy at a time when email did not exist—she wrote a lot of letters."

Louise transitioned gender roles in 1944, without the benefit of estrogen. She did not, in fact, desire hormones or surgery. Friends helped her perfect her presentation as a woman, including waxing her face to remove hair. Her transition ended her marriage.

Little is known about Louise's later years. She died in 1976. In Vallejo, California, Ms. Bob Davis has established a transgender archive named in her honor.



From 2002-2019, Fantasia Fair was produced by the nonprofit Real Life Experiences. This year, the Fair is being run by International Transgender Education Organization, a nonprofit created for that express purpose.

ITEO was incorporated in 2018 in the State of Massachusetts, and has been granted 501(c)(3) nonprofit status by the Internal Revenue Service. That means cash donations can be deducted under IRS rules. Massachusetts has granted ITEO charitable status, which means the organization is exempt from sales and some other taxes. Both the 501(c)(3) and Massachusetts tax-exempt status will reduce operating costs for the Fair, which will eventually be reflected in lower registration rates. Fair director Dee LaValle has begun to approach national corporations about sponsorships

The board of directors of ITEO consists of Dallas Denny (Chair), Kerri Reeder (Treasurer), Karen Jandro (Massachusetts agent), Kate B., Carrie Lopes, Sibil Greiner, and Tina Simmons.
